Teaching activities for preventing online child sexual abuse.

Some criminals use the Internet to deceive children and get intimate material, or use children's photos that they have shared or have been published without their consent. When faced with this type of problem, shame, fear and ignorance often prevent children from reacting. Support amongst peers is essential for minimising negative consequences.



















Teacher's worksheet





Aim of this teaching resource

Recommended age:

12-14 years

Talking naturally about the risks of the Internet is a key factor in preventing problems such as online sexual abuse. Activities like these enable us to provide them with tools to detect and take the right action when they encounter these situations in real.



What do you need?

Each student will need copies of the content worksheet, and a space or resource to communicate with their group (putting tables together in the classroom or using a virtual application).



Getting started!

Answers

Activity 1:

Divide the class into groups of 3-4 students, each one should identify the profiles that they feel are trustworthy, and discuss the reasons for their choice. They can then share and combine their conclusions with the other groups.

Extension: Look for news about cases of grooming and online sexual abuse that gives explanations about the types of tricks that the offenders used.

Activity 2:

Each group decides what is the most appropriate reaction in each situation of online sexual abuse.

Extension: Each student calls the helpline, Safer Internet Centre or law enforcement agency of their country for help with a real query about online child sexual abuse.

Activity 1: It is impossible to confirm if profiles 1, 3 and 4 are real or not, while profile 2 can be trusted if they knew the person previously and can confirm that it is him/her. As a general rule, accepting a friendship request from someone you have not previously met face to face is not recommended. As their level of autonomy improves, they can come into contact with other people after asking for their parents' permission, and bearing in mind that anyone can create a false profile or hide their intentions on the Internet.

Activity 2: All the answers are right, but the correct thing is to bring them all together to make the reaction more complete. In the event of online sexual abuse, the important thing to do is support the victim, ask for help and react. These are very serious problems; they are crimes that are not going to go away by themselves if the right measures are not taken. Since they are sensitive issues that children often do not want to share with adults, it is important to have peers to go to, so they can support each other, and to ask for help from a trusted adult.

Louis is 13 years old and love playing online strategy games. He got to know a lot of people in the games and one of them offered him a patch that helped him get free extras for his favourite game. He was keen to try it out and installed it on his computer, but a few days later he discovered that something was wrong. The same person wrote to him saying that he had his photos and even a video of him getting undressed in his room, and he told Louis to connect via webcam in exchange for not publishing the images.

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Call the helpline, Safer Internet Centre or law enforcement agency of your country together.
Support him by listening to his experience, letting him tell you about what happened and what fears he has. You really need a friend when you have problems.

Check that you only use official apps to avoid risks.



Keep the webcam of your electronic devices covered when not in use.

information about Asian culture for a
project, she saw an advert for a pornography
website that she did not like at all. The image
showed a girl with Asian features in a
swimming costume, she looked very young
and scared. She's not sure if it's right or
wrong to see this kind of advert, and she
does not know what to do.

Investigate together how to increase the security of devices connected to the Internet: install and update the antivirus, ad-blockers and keep the adult content filters activated.
Go with her and talk to your teachers, tell them what happened and ask for advice about what to do.
